A MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERS



Dear JA Supporter:

The 2019-2020 school year was certainly unforgettable! Children and educators here in Miami, and throughout the globe, were presented with unforeseen challenges as a result of the coronavirus pandemic, having to finish out the school year at home and adjust to a “new normal” of remote learning. Yet despite the challenges, this past school year was also packed with success stories, productivity, creativity, and above all, resilience. Junior Achievement remained steadfast in our mission to empower young people to own their economic success, helping to “inspire tomorrow” for our community’s children, both before and during the pandemic.

Before the pandemic reared its ugly head, the 2019-2020 school year kicked off with great excitement, as we prepared for the Inaugural JA Inspire, our newest program designed to help middle schoolers explore various high-wage/high-demand careers and INSPIRE them to pursue their dreams. There was the 1920’s-themed Stock Market Challenge, a high school program that teaches investing. And there was Future Bound, Miami’s first CSA (children’s savings account) initiative for kindergartners. All of this was in addition to our regularly scheduled JA programming, including JA in a Day and Job Shadow events. It was a busy first half of the school year!

We began to hear about COVID-19 in early 2020, and by mid-March, schools throughout the nation were closing their physical doors and pivoting to remote learning. Practically overnight, Junior Achievement was able to provide digital and virtual program delivery, releasing a comprehensive library of free online learning resources available to the public and educators alike. Our only goal was to help children continue learning, to allow them to dream about and prepare for tomorrow, instead of worrying about the uncertainties of today. We believe we were successful. You’ll see the results of our pivot in the following pages, as well as highlights of our programs, and most importantly – long lists of people and businesses who have provided unwavering support. Without you, we couldn’t reach the nearly 33,000 young people who needed our programs this year. Without you, we wouldn’t be where we are today, in a position to help INSPIRE TOMORROW for Miami’s children.

While we don’t know exactly what tomorrow will look like, when children will be able to return to a normal classroom setting, we do know one thing: Junior Achievement will be here to provide financial literacy, workforce readiness, and entrepreneurship education to our community’s children.

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BRIEF HISTORY OF Junior Achievement

Junior Achievement (JA) is a non-profit organization with the purpose of inspiring and preparing young people to succeed in a global economy. Our mission is to **empower young people to own their economic success.**

Junior Achievement was founded in 1919 to give high school students real-world business experience. Since then, JA has expanded to serve children in grades K-12 with volunteer-delivered programs that foster work-readiness, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy skills, and use experiential learning to inspire students to dream big and reach their potential.

JA has reached over 1 million children in South Florida since incorporating locally in 1957.

Junior Achievement has 106 local JA Areas across the nation, and together we are the nation's largest organization dedicated to giving young people the knowledge and skills they need to own their economic success, plan for their futures, and make smart academic and economic choices. JA's programs—in the core content areas of **work readiness**, **entrepreneurship**, and **financial literacy**—ignite the spark in young people to experience and realize the opportunities and realities of work and life in the 21st century. Nationally, **Junior Achievement reaches nearly 4.8 million students per year** in 208,373 classrooms and after-school locations. JA programs are taught by volunteers in inner cities, suburbs, and rural areas throughout the United States.

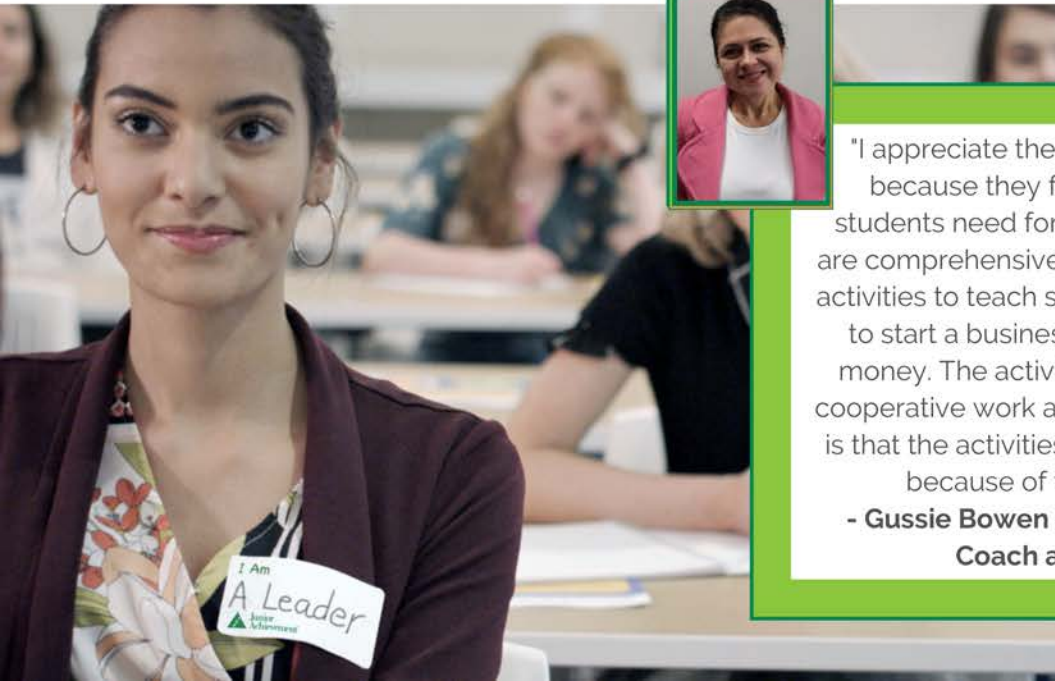
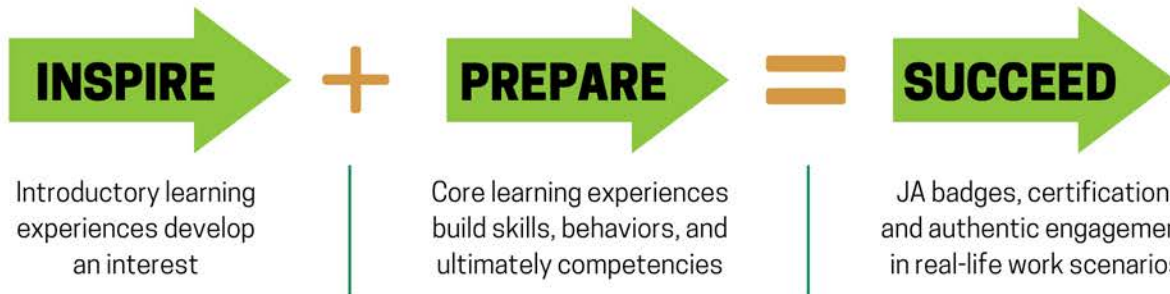

JA in a Day

JA in a Day is a special program delivery method that facilitates a mutually beneficial partnership between corporate volunteers and an elementary school. Volunteers benefit from JA in a Day in many ways, from developing a sense of pride after helping students learn new concepts, to knowing they were able to make a difference in a short amount of time. Elementary schools benefit from giving their students additional learning opportunities, taught by positive role models, that have the potential to be life-changing.

The JA Ourselves®, JA Our Families®, JA Our Community®, JA Our City®, JA Our Region® and JA Our Nation® program activities work to change children's lives by helping them understand their roles as individuals, consumers, and workers.

Future Bound Miami

Success starts with savings. Future Bound Miami is dedicated to giving children an opportunity to have their own Children's Savings Account (CSA), so they can start saving early. Junior Achievement participated in this groundbreaking initiative by providing our Kindergarten curriculum, delivered by dedicated Junior Achievement volunteers, to all student participants. The curriculum, called JA Ourselves, focuses on earning, saving, and spending, and introduces students to the fundamental concept of "needs vs. wants".

JA Inspire

JA Inspire is a groundbreaking career exploration program designed for students in 8th grade and consists of three segments: 1) three in-class sessions; 2) JA Inspire Career Expo, and; 3) a post-Career Expo debrief. JA Inspire forges a critical link between school and the workplace, opening students' minds to what is possible and the steps they will need to take to achieve success in the future. JA Miami held the Inaugural JA Inspire Career Expo on November 19, 2019, welcoming over 3,000 students to learn about local careers.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS HIGHLIGHTS

JA Company Program

The JA Company Program unlocks the innate ability in high school students to fill a need or solve a problem in their community by launching a real-life business venture and unleashing their entrepreneurial spirit. Half of the sessions are led by a volunteer, and the rest are driven by the students and their teacher.

"I had the chance of a lifetime when I was able to participate in the JA Company Program during my senior year of high school. I have always had a passion for business, but I was not sure how I could get started. With the help of this program, I was able to learn how to work with my peers, present a business idea in a clear manner, and the importance of keeping an open mind and accepting constructive criticism in order to improve.

The biggest lesson I got out of the JA Company Program is that the only person you have control over is yourself. I learned that sometimes you have to step up and cover for people who are not doing their part of the job. In addition, I learned that we should not give up when something goes wrong because nothing good comes easy. Thanks to the lessons I learned, I was able to grow as a person and learn how to start a business."

Junior Achievement Stock Market Challenge

The Junior Achievement Stock Market Challenge is a unique program that allows high school students to visualize, first-hand, how the laws of economics unfold in the real world. Volunteers visit high school classrooms, instructing the theory of the stock market and allowing students to gain a fundamental understanding of investing. The program culminates in a county-wide stock market simulation where students compete to be named the most savvy investors in Miami!

After the students have completed their stock market simulation, sponsors of the program are invited to the same venue to test their market savviness in their own Stock Market Challenge! This is a fun, fast-paced event for our adult supporters. The 2019 event boasted a "Roaring Twenties" theme to celebrate JA's centennial anniversary, complete with costumes, specialty beverages, and stock picks from the 1920's!

The 2020 program and event will be fully virtual, with students competing in school or at home, and a special virtual event on the evening of November 17, 2020 for sponsors and their families!

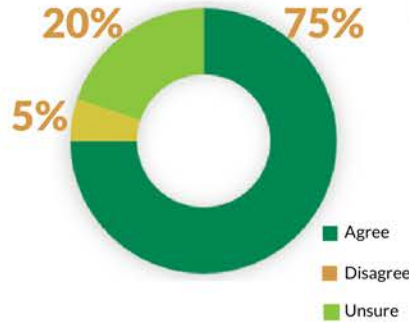
